Summary

During July 2021, some services suspended during the COVID-19 pandemic resumed, including pet licensing and enforcement, owner surrenders, animal nuisance enforcement, and partial in-shelter volunteer activities. Services and shelter access remained limited for January 2022.




Animal Intake

MCAS accepted stray dogs, sick or injured adult cats, kittens 6 weeks to 6 months old, and officers also picked up stray or lost animals. Owner-surrendered animals were accepted on a case by case basis, depending on urgent circumstances. Other intakes commonly represent animals placed into protective custody by Animal Services officers.

Veterinary Care Provided

Animal Health and Animal Care staff provided a wide range of veterinary services to animals in care.



To keep animals healthy, Animal Health staff, and partner veterinarians in the community administered 1,013 vaccinations,

including rabies, <u>DA2PP</u> and Bordetella for dogs and puppies, and <u>FVRCP</u> for cats and kittens.



They provided 942 health exams and consultations, including routine exams, wound checks, pre-surgery checkups, behavior assessments, and reviewing test results or diagnoses with foster volunteers.


Fostered Animals

In January 2022, forty-four (44) animals entered foster care, joining the existing fifty-eight (58) animals already in care at the beginning of the month. The majority of animals in foster care were adult cats and kittens.

MCAS foster volunteers cared for a total of one-hundred-and-two (102) foster animals. Twenty-nine (29) of these animals left foster care for other outcomes over the course of the month, so the total number does not represent the maximum number of animals in care at one time.

Animal Outcomes

In January 2022, ninety animals (33.6%) were adopted. Adoptions were limited to the online process, and adopters were not able to browse

kennels or conduct adoption interviews on-site. Adoptions were also performed from community adoption partners, and foster homes.

One-hundred-and-six animals (39.6%) were reclaimed by their owners. The majority of animals represented in these outcomes were dogs.


Forty-one animals (15.3%) were transferred to another agency, including Oregon Humane Society, Portland Audubon Society, and Cat Adoption Team. The majority of these animals were dogs, cats, kittens, and wildlife.

Twenty-nine animals (10.8%) were humanely euthanized, including cases of injured wildlife, injured or

cases of injured wildlife, injured or severely sick cats, and other domestic animals at the recommendation of a veterinarian, or for behavioral issues which would make an animal unsafe to place back into the community. Cat intake is officially limited to cases where the cat is sick or injured, or in immediate danger due to cruelty, neglect, and similar circumstances, and kittens over six weeks old. There is decreased intake volume for cats, and an increased percentage of veterinary-recommended euthanasia for adult cats due to these intake conditions.

Two cats (0.7%) were returned to the field at the location where they were found.






Online Resources
