Summary

During June 2022, in response to staff shortages, and in an effort to reduce shelter population, MCAS held a waived-fee adoption event, and later waived adoption fees throughout the month. Services and shelter access were limited.




Animal Intake

MCAS accepted stray dogs, sick or injured adult cats, kittens 6 weeks to 6 months old, and officers also picked up stray or lost animals. Owner-surrendered animals were accepted on a case by case basis, depending on urgent circumstances. Other intakes commonly represent animals placed into protective custody by Animal Services officers.

Veterinary Care Provided

Animal Health and Animal Care staff provided a wide range of veterinary services to animals in care.



To keep animals healthy, Animal Health staff, and partner veterinarians in the community administered 1,313 vaccinations,

including rabies, <u>DA2PP</u> and Bordetella for dogs and puppies, and <u>FVRCP</u> for cats and kittens.



They provided 1,273 health exams and consultations, including routine exams, wound checks, pre-surgery checkups, behavior assessments, and reviewing test results or diagnoses with foster volunteers.


Fostered Animals

In June 2022, the majority of animals in foster care were kittens, adult cats, dogs, and rabbits. Many animals entered and left foster care over the course of the month, so the total number does not represent the maximum number of animals in care at one time.

Animals in Foster Care




Animal Outcomes

In June 2022, one-hundred-sixty-eight animals (34.1%) were adopted. With the exception of a two day adoption event, adoptions were limited to

the online process, and adopters were not able to browse kennels or conduct adoption interviews on-site. Adoptions were also performed from community adoption partners, and foster homes.

One-hundred-thirty-two animals (26.8%) were reclaimed by their owners. The majority of animals represented in these outcomes were dogs.

One-hundred-thirty-eight (28%) were transferred to another agency, including Oregon Humane Society, Cat Adoption Team, Rabbit Advocates, and Northwest Animal Companions. The majority of these animals were kittens, dogs, cats, and rabbits.

Animal Services

Forty-five animals (9.1%) were humanely euthanized, including cases of injured wildlife, injured or severely sick cats, and other domestic animals at the recommendation of a veterinarian, or for behavioral issues which would make an animal unsafe to place back into the community. Cat intake is officially limited to cases where the cat is sick or injured, or in immediate danger due to cruelty, neglect, and similar circumstances, and kittens over six weeks old. There is decreased intake volume for cats, and an increased percentage of veterinary-recommended euthanasia for adult cats due to these intake conditions.


One cat and two wild birds (0.6%) were returned to the field at the location where they were found. Four kittens, a rabbit, and a squirrel (1.2%) had unassisted deaths while in care. One cat (0.2%) was lost while in care.


Online Resources
