During September 2022, Services and shelter access were limited. Adoptions were conducted virtually.




Animal Intake


MCAS accepted stray dogs, sick or injured adult cats, kittens 6 weeks to 6 months old, and officers also picked up stray or lost animals. Owner-surrendered animals were accepted on a case by case basis, depending on urgent circumstances. Other intakes commonly represent animals placed into protective custody by Animal Services officers.

Veterinary Care Provided





To keep animals healthy, Animal Health staff, and partner veterinarians in the community administered 1,347 vaccinations,


including rabies, <u>DA2PP</u> and Bordetella for dogs and puppies, and <u>FVRCP</u> for cats and kittens.



They provided 1,502 health exams and consultations, including routine exams, wound checks, pre-surgery checkups, behavior assessments, and reviewing test results or diagnoses with foster volunteers.



Animal Outcomes

In September 2022, two-hundred-twenty-three animals (37.1%) were adopted. Adoption fees were waived, limited to the online process, and

adopters were not able to browse kennels or conduct adoption interviews on-site. Adoptions were also performed from community adoption partners, and foster homes.

One-hundred-fifty-two animals (25.3%) were reclaimed by their owners. The majority of animals represented in these outcomes were dogs.

One-hundred-fifty-seven animals (26.1%) were transferred to another agency. The majority of these animals were kittens, cats, dogs, and rabbits.

Sixty animals (10%) were humanely euthanized, including cases of injured wildlife, injured or severely sick cats, and other domestic • Adopted

animals at the recommendation of a veterinarian, or for behavioral issues which would make an animal unsafe to place back into the community. Cat intake is officially limited to cases where the cat is sick or injured, or in immediate danger due to cruelty, neglect, and similar circumstances, and kittens over six weeks old. There is decreased intake volume for cats, and an increased percentage of veterinary-recommended euthanasia for adult cats due to these intake conditions.

Six kittens (1%) were returned to the field at the location where they were found. Three kittens (0.5%) had unassisted deaths while in care.




Online Resources
